Session objectives:

Running a Tudor Court was a difficult and expensive job. Rivalries simmered in the hot kitchens, as people vied for the best jobs running Henry VIII's household. In the heart of the Tudor kitchens, students will explore behind the scenes stories of how the Tudor court was run, who ate what, and the real cost of Henry's extravagant court.
