The power of Wolsey – A-level Teacher notes

Session overview

During this 90 minute session students will use the Palace as a source. Reading the buildings and cross-referencing with contemporary accounts, students will investigate how Hampton Court Palace supported Thomas Wolsey's rise to power. Students will consider the relationship between Henry and Wolsey at the very beginning of Henry's reign and the different reasons why he fell from grace. The Palace particularly highlights the wealth of the Cardinal, his arrogance and the role of both the Privy Chamber and of Anne Boleyn in bringing about his fall.

Schedule

Your 90 minute session will consist of the following:

- 15 minute introduction to the concept of 'crisis' and the development of the Palace over time;
- 60 minute subject specific tour, engaging students through investigation of the built environment and analysis of documentary sources;
- 15 minute plenary during which students draw upon what they have learnt to reach their own conclusions about the topic.

Session objectives

- To explore, analyse, interpret and cross-reference different types of primary evidence (portraits/ buildings/ written evidence); evaluating the difficulties/limitations of available evidence.
- To demonstrate a deeper understanding of the political, social and economic factors of the Tudor era as evident at Hampton Court Palace.
- To use contemporary accounts to weigh up why Wolsey fell from power and decide whether his downfall was inevitable or could have been prevented.
