The driving force of the Reformation – A-level Teacher notes

Session overview

During this 90 minute session students will use the Palace as a source, reading the buildings and cross-referencing with contemporary accounts in the source booklet which they are given. Students will consider the different reasons why Henry broke with the Catholic Church and are introduced to the idea that Henry might not have always been in control of events during the Reformation years. Students will discuss which was the most important factor(s) driving the Reformation. The Palace particularly highlights the influence Anne Boleyn had over Henry, the importance which Henry attached to securing a male heir and the role which Henry assumed for himself as the spiritual leader of his people.

Schedule

Your 90 minute session will consist of the following:

- 15 minute introduction to the concept of 'crisis' and the development of the Palace over time;
- 60 minute subject specific tour, engaging students through investigation of the built environment and analysis of documentary sources;
- 15 minute plenary during which students draw upon what they have learnt to reach their own conclusions about the topic.

Session objectives

- To explore, analyse, interpret and cross-reference different types of primary evidence (portraits/ buildings/ written evidence); evaluating the difficulties/limitations of available evidence.
- To demonstrate a deeper understanding of the political, social and economic factors of the Tudor era as evident at Hampton Court Palace.
- To use contemporary accounts to weigh up the causes of the Reformation.
