

Mid-Tudor Crisis – Study Day

Teacher notes

Duration: 4.5h

Meeting Point: Entrance to Learning Centre

Succession for the taking? The Mid-Tudor period saw the stability of the monarchy and its future legacies thrown into question.

In this session, students will analyse the Tower buildings and documentary evidence to explore the Tower's use by Tudor monarchs as a symbol of fear and power during this turbulent period.

Through the prisoners who have left their marks on the buildings of the Tower itself, students will consider how the Tower can be used to evaluate the Mid-Tudor period and its fluctuating political landscape.

This study day will also include a session on using portraiture as historical evidence at the National Portrait Gallery.

Session A

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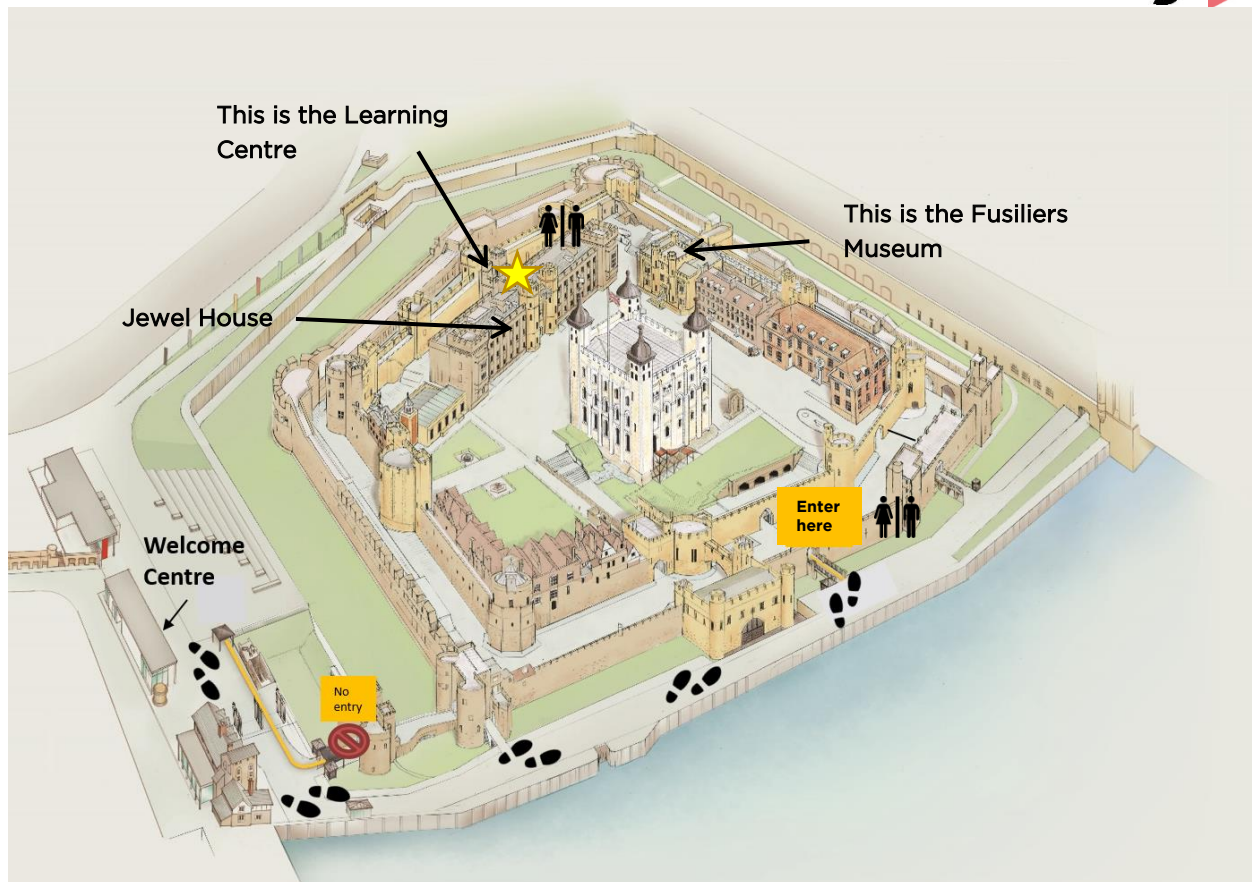
Directions:

National Portrait Gallery:

1. Enter by the Main Entrance in St Martin's Place and send your students down one flight of stairs to the Upper Basement, to wait briefly outside the Lecture Theatre (the toilets are here, too).
2. The Group Leader should go up to the Information Desk in the Main Hall to sign in.
3. Visitor Services staff will call your Gallery teacher to meet your group outside the Lecture Theatre.
4. The first part of your session will be in the Theatre and then you will go up to the galleries to continue working in front of the pictures.



The Tower of London:



- Pick up your wristbands from the Welcome Centre and enter the Tower of London via Middle Drawbridge.
- Head to the back of the Jewel House, walking past the Fusiliers Museum.
- Continue past the visitor toilets until you come across a chain with a sign saying “No entry except for booked school parties”.
- Pass over this; the entrance to the Learning Centre will be on your left.
- Your presenter will be waiting for you (marked with a yellow star).
- Allow 15 minutes from the Welcome Centre to the Learning Centre.

Getting to and from the Tower and National Portrait Gallery

- The quickest and easiest way to travel between the two sites is by **tube**
 - ✓ Walk from the National Portrait Gallery to Embankment underground station - 15 minutes
 - ✓ Take the Circle/ District Line at Embankment to Tower Hill - 9 minutes approx. (see map below).
 - ✓ Walk from Tower Hill station to the Welcome Centre - 5 minutes
- Alternatively the no. 15 **bus** can take you between Tower Hill and Trafalgar Square (Fleet Street) - approx. 15-20 minutes (see map below)

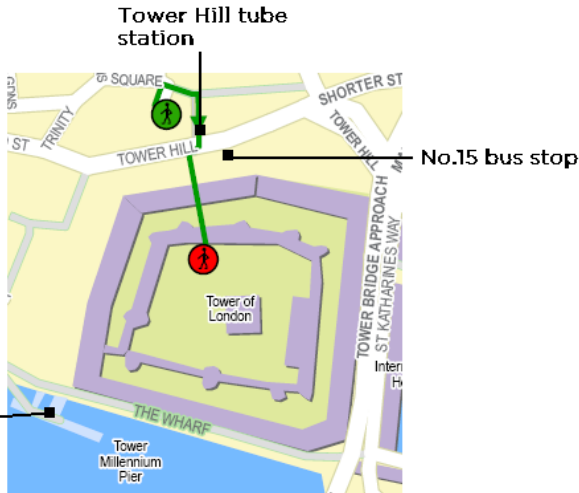


- There is also the Thames Clipper **boat** service that can take you between the Embankment and Tower piers- approx. 20-25 minutes.
