

Opening Up the World Teacher notes

Duration: 90 minutes

Meeting Point: West Front

Hampton Court is full of silk tapestries, costly spices and other treasures Tudor monarchs acquired from all around the world. Find out about adventurous seafarers and merchants who risked their lives to bring exotic wares to England.

In this session, a costumed presenter will lead children through the palace to understand how the world changed in Tudor times politically. Children will look at copies of Tudor navigational maps to develop methods of enquiry and analysis to understand why the Tudors sought to explore, and why they chose the routes they did, in the context of trade, profit and geopolitics.

Learning Objectives:

Children will:

- Use historical maps to understand how the knowledge and concept of the world changed in Tudor times.
- Develop methods of enquiry and analysis to understand why the Tudors sought to explore, and why they chose the routes they did.
- Hypothesise about what drove captains, sailors, investors and monarchs to want to explore the world.

 Exploring a theme in British history that extends chronological knowledge beyond 1066 (changes in an aspect of social history).


Geography
