

Crime and Punishment KS2

Teacher notes

Duration: 60 minutes

Meeting Point: Tower of London: Salt Tower courtyard

As one of the world's most infamous prisons, the Tower of London has seen many people locked within the fortress walls. But who exactly was imprisoned here? And what conditions did they live in?

In this session, children will put themselves into a prisoner's shoes. A costumed presenter will recount exciting stories from the Tower's dark history, whilst exploring some of the historic spaces originally used to hold prisoners.

Learning objectives

Children will:

- Increase their knowledge of the Tower of London as a prison
- Come to understand the role of a state prison in the past and how this compares to prisons in the present day.
- Appreciate the reality of historical events studied in the classroom by placing them in the context of where the events occured here at the Tower

- Significant turning points in British history


During your session
