#### Introduction

Jews first settled in medieval England sometime after the Norman Conquest and remained here until they were forced to convert or go into exile by Edward I in 1290. London soon emerged as one of the major sites of Jewish settlement and, from 1189, we find evidence of a link between the Tower of London and England's Jews, as the Constable of the Tower was the local royal official responsible for London's Jews. This aspect of London's history can be found in a very broad range of manuscripts scattered across multiple archives but has never been the subject of a dedicated search aid. This catalogue is the first to catalogue the sources for Jewish people in medieval London and the Tower. The catalogue currently stands at 700 entries, ranging from the twelfth century to nineteenth-century transcripts of medieval documents. It includes sources relating both to medieval London's Jewish community and also to the city's Jewish converts to Christianity. This introduction will provide an overview of the status of Jewish people in medieval England, followed by a brief description of the medieval court system which make up the bulk of the sources discussed here. Finally, there is an explanation of the editorial conventions used in compiling this catalogue.

#### Jews in medieval England

Jewish people first came to England in the late eleventh century following the Norman Conquest. The initial community came from Rouen in Normandy. By the end of the following century, communities had been established in most of the major cities and towns of England, with London one of the largest.

Each community, or Jewry, was overseen by the local royal official, normally the sheriff or the constable of the nearby royal castle. Because of the Jews' legal status as the king's property, these officials were responsible for both protecting them from anti-Jewish violence and for exploiting them financially. Jews were barred from most occupations but could lend money at interest to Christians. Many of the wealthier Anglo-Jews made their riches this way and the king, in turn, could then tax this wealth or seize the debts owed to a moneylender for himself. Even if they converted to Christianity, their property was then forfeited to the king. Many of these converts went on to live in the Domus conversorum in London, a house founded for the purpose by Henry III in 1232. This exploitation would not end with a Jewish person's death, at which point a third of their estate was supposed to pass to the king.

The king's inheritance of one such vast estate, that of Aaron of Lincoln, and the anti-Jewish massacres of 1190, led to the crown developing a centralised system to administer Jewish moneylending.

By 1194, the *archa* system had been established. Each city or town with an official Jewish settlement had its own charter chest, or *archa*, in which records of debts had to be deposited. This was overseen by four officials called chirographers, two Christian and two Jewish. Each had one of the four keys to the *archa*. At Westminster, the Exchequer of the Jews sat at the top of the *archa* system, carrying out administrative business and also hearing legal cases between Jewish people or involving Jewish debts.

## The legal system

Medieval English courts used a number of terms and concepts that seem deceptively familiar to us today, like juror, fine, or trespass, but none of which have quite the same meaning and so require some explanation. Medieval jurors were not an impartial panel of one's peers sworn in to hear evidence and deliver a verdict. They were instead sworn to give evidence and deliver a verdict and were typically local people who had a familiarity with the case or with the parties involved. In the Exchequer of the Jews, juries were usually mixed, half Jewish and half Christian.

Cases were referred to as pleas, with accusers impleading a defendant. A common plea was one of trespass. This did not necessarily mean someone entering another's property without permission, it instead referred to a wrong or crime. The Latin word for trespass, *transgressio*, gives us the word transgression, which is a more appropriate understanding of what medieval courts meant by trespass. The most serious type of offence was a felony, which included crimes such as treason, murder, and rape. Defendants were normally imprisoned pending trial in the case of felonies, but not in the case of trespass. People could be bailed, which was referred to as mainprise. Their bailers, or mainpernors, would be penalised if they failed to ensure the defendant's appearance in court.

As well as financial, custodial, and capital punishments, defendants could also be outlawed or forced to abjure the realm (go into exile abroad). Outlawry meant that a person was placed beyond the protection of the law and it would be illegal for anyone to aid or assist them. Fines were a key part of the process, and not only as punishments. Parties could, among other things, pay a fine to delay a court case, bring one forward, or delay judgement being administered.

England had a series of different courts at local, county, and national level, but the court that the individuals discussed here often had the most contact with was the Exchequer of the Jews. Created in 1194, this court was dedicated to cases and administration involving Jewish people and Jewish moneylending. Even cases solely between Christians but involving a debt originally owed to a Jew could be heard at this court.

Held at Westminster, the Exchequer of the Jews sat in four terms each year. Hilary Term ran from late January into February, Easter Term from two weeks after Easter Sunday until Ascension, Trinity from eight days after Trinity Sunday until late July or early August, and Michaelmas Term, from October to the start of December. The court heard a range of cases, including arguments over debts and property sales, to serious criminal charges of theft, fraud, and even murder. The Exchequer of the Jews also engaged in administrative business regarding Jewish debts. Cases involving Jews were supposed to be heard only at this court, unless the king specified otherwise, but we do sometimes find them appearing in other courts as well.

## Money

In medieval England, money was divided into pounds (£), shillings (s), and pence (d). There were 12 pence in every shilling, and 20 shillings in a pound (and therefore 240 pence in a pound). There was also another unit of currency, the mark, worth 13s 4d, that is, two thirds of a pound. Until the mid-thirteenth century, however, only the silver penny existed as a physical coin. To complicate things further, sometimes foreign coins were used in transactions, including Arabic or Greek bezants, obols from Murcia in Muslim Spain, and florins from Florence.

#### Editorial conventions

The entries are arranged alphabetically by the city in which the archival repository is located, then by the archive, then by series, and finally by manuscript reference. Each entry records a title for the source, which is normally a description of the type of document, e.g. Charter, Writ, etc., though it could also be something more specific like 'Matthew Paris, *Chronica Maiora*'. The manuscript reference follows, the date (that is, the date of creation, not necessarily the date that the content relates to), and a brief physical description, which is normally limited to describing the size of the document, i.e. number of folios, the languages used, and noting any significant damage. Then the entry summarises the material relevant to Anglo-Jewish history in London or the Tower (because most of these documents are not solely related to that topic, it could just be a single folio out of a hundred), including the folio or membrane number. The entries then end with a list of published editions of the relevant material, including digitised manuscripts.

In the process of compiling a list of manuscripts to catalogue, it was soon realised that it would not be possible to catalogue all of the over 1,000 manuscript sources relating to Jews in medieval London. Instead, it tries to catalogue all the sources relating to Jews at the Tower, and most of those relating only to London. It is hoped that future funding will allow the remaining sources to be added at a later date.

Mistsel, imprisoned for the like offences, has since died in prison.

m. 3d (no. 130), on 14 June 1239, William son of Bernard and his servant Richard went to Josce the Jew's house, where they killed him and his wife Henna and then fled. Afterwards William was arrested at St Saviour's for stealing a silver cup and was hanged. Richard is to be outlawed. Miles le Espicer, who was with them in the fight and badly wounded, fled to a church and died. No attachment was made because this happened in the Jewry, and the right to make attachments there belongs only to the Constable of the Tower of London, not to the sheriffs; (no. 131) after lunch on 23 August 1239, Henna wife of Jacob son of Floria went to the house of Alfred de Pinchbeck, Parmenter, while he was at the fair in King's Lynn and was never seen again. Jacob appeals Isabel, Alfred's wife, who was in the house at the time, Agnes, Isabel's maid-servant Maud, and Peter of Shaftesbury.

m. 5d (no. 208), regarding the king's escheats, the tenements of Christians and Jews, who holds them, from whom, for what service, and their value. Martin de Virly, a Norman, held two messuages in the City of London which escheated to King John when Martin withdrew his allegiance. The king gave them to Berner in Rouen, who demised one to Leo the Jew, which is worth 5 marks a year; (no. 219) Adrian Asshwy holds a house in St Martin's Lane, London, which belonged to Josce the Jew. Adrian says that Josce did not die seised of the house, because he sold it to Adrian's ancestor a long time before the war. He produces Josce's starr and the starr of Josce's daughter and heir Floria; (no. 220) let there be a discussion concerning certain lands and houses, including the houses which belonged to John Herlizun, which the king assigned to the converts.

m. 7 (no. 280), Martin de Virly, citizen of Rouen, had some land in Milk Street and Bread Street when he left the king's allegiance. These escheated to the king who gave then to Berner de Rouen. Now Leo holds the land in Milk Street, having bought it from Berner. It is worth 40s a year.

m. 7d (no. 296), a messuage in Ironmonger Lane which belonged to Ralph Eswy I was taken into the king's hand by order of the justices as they were given to understand that a Jew called Josce son of David passed it to Ralph at the beginning of the war so that he would vouch for

him against the barons. It remained to Ralph and Josce was unable to recover it. Therefore the messuage ought to belong to the king.

m. 8 (no. 312), regarding the house of Adrian Eswy, because it was believed that the house belonged to Josce the Jew when Josce had a debt of £80 to King John, an inquest into the matter was held. Men of the four wards testified that Josce never held the house or any part of it nor was he the pledge of the king. The Exchequer is to decide if the house if to be burdened with the £80 debt or not.

m. 8d (no. 345), memorandum that on 24 May 1246, Alfred of Pinchbeck showed the justices of crown pleas before the mayor of London and other citizens that when John de Coudres was sheriff, John unjustly imprisoned him. Alfred and his wife and family were imprisoned on the appeal of murder by a Jew for the death of his wife. When a pledge was demanded of him, Alfred supposedly drew his knife and attacked the bailiff. The court finds that he did not attack the bailiff and John had no right to extract a pledge from Alfred. John is to be bailed pending the king's decision and the bailiff to be imprisoned.

m. 9 (nos. 384), regarding purprestures. The brothers of the Domus Conversorum have built a pentice; (no. 398) Sleme the widow, sister of Elias l'Eveske, built three pentices in Ironmonger Lane to the nuisance. They are to be amended. Because she is dead her heirs are in mercy; (no. 399) Moses the Jew has built a pentice in Ironmonger Lane. It is to be amended; (no. 400) Josce of Canterbury, Jew, has built a pentice in Ironmonger Lane, as has Isaac of Paris, Jew, Jacob of Warwick, Beliasez the Jew, Elias the Jew, and Josce of Oxford, Jew. They are to be amended and the Jews are in mercy; (no. 401) Coleman Street Ward, Benedict Crespin the Jew has blocked up a lane between the king's highway and Colechurch and Lothbury Street. Let it be opened completely until he shows warrant and he is to be in mercy; (no. 403) Benedict Crespin the Jew has blocked up a lane next to the chapel of St Mary Coneyhope; (no. 411) Leo the Jew has built two solars to the nuisance. Let them be amended. His is in mercy for half a gold mark; (no. 413) Josce the Jew has a step to his cellar to the nuisance. Let it be amended; (no. 414), Elias l'Eveske, Jew, has two posts before his door in the king's highway. Let them be demolished.

The London Jewry was destroyed, and all the Jews' property carried off and many were brutally killed, as much as 500. Those who survived were saved by the justices and the mayor, having been sent to the Tower before the attack began, along with the London *archa* (1263).

f. 110v (p. 110), Henry III grants a charter of rights to the Londoners, but reserves his rights in respect of London's Jews (1267).

f. 143r (pp. 176-77), the sheriffs and other citizens were summoned before the king's council at Westminister. Before a group of Jews, the sheriffs and citizens were asked about Jews and the meat they eat, including whether it was lawful for Christians to buy unkosher meat from Jews and eat this. The citizens said no and such Christians should be expelled, fined, and the meat would be given to lepers or dogs. They asked if they should administer a harsher punishment, but the council said no, unless the king should will it. The sheriffs and citizens were ordered to enforce this custom (1273).

m. 7 (*CPREJ*, v, no. 612), Robert de Merk vs Master Elias son of Master Moses in a plea of account. And he does not come. The Constable of the Tower is ordered to bring him and he returns that Elias' mainpernors, Abraham son of Benedict and Moses Poteman, do not have him.

m. 7d (*CPREJ*, v, no. 629), Gilbert Peche offered himself against Benedict le Benour in a plea that he restore to him a Bible, three cloths of gold, and other pledges worth 40 marks. Benedict did not come. The Constable of the Tower was ordered to bring him but he returned that he is a fugitive for his last tallage.

m. 8 (*CPREJ*, v, no. 641), order for the Constable of the Tower to proclaim in the synagogues of the Jews that any Jews who are creditors of Gilbert of Dakenham, should appear before the court to implead him. The Constable returned a writ in which the following Jews have signed: Manasser son of Ursel, Sampson of Solomon, Moses son of Ursel, and Josce son of Abraham.

m. 8d (*CPREJ*, v, no. 646), abbot of Thornton vs Hagin son of Master Moses, in a plea of warranty of acquittance of a debt. The Constable of the Tower was ordered to bring Hagin before the court.

m. 9d (*CPREJ*, v, no. 670), memorandum that Hake of Canterbury and Abraham of Dorking, who were charged with the death of Matthew de Okam, killed in the street of St Lawrence's Jewry, were placed by the bailiff up to now through a writ of the king. Elias son of Elias, Meir son of Sampson, and Sampson of Worcester, Jews, mainperned for them. The Constable of the Tower is to find 12 Jews for the jury.

m. 11 (CPREJ, v, no. 686), Hake of Canterbury and Abraham of Dorking, who were charged

with the death of Matthew de Okam, killed in the street of St Lawrence's Jewry, put themselves

upon the country. The inquest by Henry le Rus, Alexander the tailor, Andrew the goldsmith,

and other Christians, and by Solomon Bunting, Elias of Cornhill, and other Jews, say that Hake

and Abraham are not culpable for Matthew's death. Whether they know who was or were guilty

of the death, the jury says they do not know. The two men are quit of suspicion of murder.

deceased Jew, by Henry le Rus, Penc of Hereford and other Christians and by Jacob le clerk,

On reaching Southwark, the bailiff demanded a toll, claiming he had a right to 2s for every cart carrying dead Jews. The bailiff's men insulted, beat, and mistreated the three Jews. A certain tabard was seized as a toll and the small cart which bore Josce's body was overturned. The jurors (six Christians of Southwark and six Jews of London) testified that these Christians and other unnamed men had seized the cart of the orders of the bailiff of Southwark, took the tabard for toll, and attacked the Jews. They said that this violated the king's peace as Jews never had to pay tolls anywhere in England. The Christians are imprisoned until they satisfy the king and the Jews, as is the bailiff, who could not produce evidence of his right to a toll.

m. 4 (*CPREJ*, vi, no. 1135/*Select Pleas*, pp. 115-16), Moses of Dog Street and his wife Bona are attached in a plea unjustly detained goods by Matilda la Megre. The Jews are found guilty and of committing usury, contravening the statute of the king, and are imprisoned in the Tower until the king is satisfied.
